Hello

With restrictions imposed during the Coronavirus pandemic being eased, there is the inevitable risk of complacency and lethargy setting in. The message from God to us in recent ministry has been to be more alert, to "stand on the tower", to live by faith and to intercede. The mighty David, who had proven the power of God in his younger experience facing Goliath, slipped when constraints on his life eased and he became vulnerable. We, too, need to be constantly alert and positively active.

Faith for Fearful Times

For Habakkuk, the journey from fear to faith was a very real one as he came through perplexing times to realise that God has, and will, deliver His people. We, too, can learn from the principles that are enunciated in the account of his experience: that, when placed in God, faith is powerful.

Some of these principles are:

Fear is real. Feeling fearful is not failure. There is reason to be fearful with events happening and likely to happen. The key is what we do with that fear: how we respond.

Fear does not need to be fatal. Genuine fear has a paralysing effect; but rather than allow fear to cripple him Habakkuk puts his faith into action.

Faith faces the facts. It is aware of who God is and of what He has done and said He will do. The calamities which the prophet dreaded did happen. Things did become desperate, but true faith believes in a real, redemptive, God.

Faith finds help. It knows where and to whom to turn in such perplexity; and so

Faith finds the way in recognising that all else will fail but deliberate trust in the all-powerful God of the Bible gives a "reason for the hope that is in you". That is a song worth singing.

More from Inga

Last week, Inga highlighted some of the challenges she faces with translation. Here are some more.

John's Gospel often uses the terms 'life' and 'death' to refer to spiritual life and death. Chapter 3:14 "We know that we have passed from death to life, because we love each other. Anyone who does not love remains in death". (NIV) presented lots of challenges – just what does it mean to pass from death to life?

The Mixtec language can use the figure of being on a road, so for this verse we have it that people, instead of being on the road that leads to death, now are on the road that leads to life. Obviously, we need to check that other people not involved in the translation will understand this figure correctly.

I had the idea of revising the Epistles of John before tackling the Gospel of John, as many of the key concepts and figures in these brief epistles are found in the much longer Gospel. It is very helpful to wrestle with how to express these ideas in Mixtec in this shorter book before turning to the revision of John's Gospel. So we press on.
