Sunday Sermon: Pentecost Plus

One significant phenomenon of Pentecost was the fact that, by the enabling of the outpoured Holy Spirit, each one of the bystanders from various language groups gathered in Jerusalem "heard (the message) in our own mother tongue".

Making that word available and understood in various contexts became the hallmark of that early group of believers as they continued in the "apostles' doctrine, fellowship, breaking of bread and prayers". (That will be the theme of the morning ministry over the next few weeks).

Bringing us up to date with her own involvement in that venture, several centuries after the initial dissemination, **Inga McKendry** spoke of the work of Wycliffe Bibe Translators and her own part in it in the Oaxaca state in Mexico - with its 60 or so languages —each the mother tongue of a people group.

Having gone out in 1985 following a challenge for Christian commitment in Jean Donnelly's Crusader class, Inga has been fully engaged in translation work. Linguistics helps to appreciate the distinctive way each language works (e.g. word order in sentences). Translation entails conveying concepts, such as 'grace' or 'salvation', in ways that are meaningful (and avoid misunderstanding) to local groups. Teams work on translation, try out the version in community groups, check and re-check before the Scriptures are made available to these folks in their remote areas. Prayer and support for such vital work is an essential partnership.
