Sunday Sermon: 1 Kings 19: 1 - 18

The question posed by God to Elijah in this week's *Questions God asks* series - "What are you doing here, Elijah?" - could be construed as a rebuke for running away from a situation and hiding in despondency. But, the nature and the tone of the ensuing dialogue suggests otherwise. If nothing else, it shows Elijah's frailty and human weakness. The people God uses are not superhuman heroes but ordinary people enabled by God's divine power.

Elijah had just witnessed a miraculous victory on Mount Carmel when God had "sent the fire" and declared himself superior to Baal. Jezebel, however, was not impressed and set out, not to worship the true God but to persecute Elijah. That was not what Elijah had hoped for and so became very despondent, literally going down into the valley in despair.

It was there that God confronted him with the query: *What are you doing here?*" It was not spoken in censure but by way of encouragement for Elijah to trust Him and continue in pursuit of God's sovereign purpose. God was watching over him. He understood Elijah's burden and disappointment, but assured him that the future lay not with Jezebel and the promotion of idol worship but with the promised triumph of God.

So, God seeks to redeploy Elijah from his inward disappointment to a positive position of appreciating that "God is working out his purpose". In the same way we can hold on and have "faith not fear". "He knows, He loves and He cares."
