Sunday Sermon: Joshua 1: 6 - 9

In this short series on the theme: You have not gone this way before, the attention has been on discovering 'how to be church' and be faithful witnesses in the uncertain situation we face as we emerge from the privations of the pandemic.

So far we have seen that, although it is unknown to us, it is totally known to God. He will not deviate from his purposes nor will he abandon his people as they seek to make progress. While the promise of his presence and provision is so reassuring it is worth noting from today's verses that we, also, have a responsibility in being colabourers with him. It should show itself in three ways.

We should recognise that, as the people of God, we have a shared responsibility for – and toward - the whole community, not just for ourselves. The two-and-a half tribes which had been allocated land east of the Jordan were committed to be fully involved until all the Ind was possessed. That corporate responsibility, with each one faithfully playing their part in the growth, nurture and accomplishment of the church's commission, is central in New Testament teaching.

Although the task meant physical fighting the command was to obey the word of God: to be guided by truth. It is the only guide for what to do and how to carry out the task of being "witnesses unto me"

And, essential to it all, is to **follow the** Spirit's guidance and move only as the 'ark' (the presence of God) moves. That means, "Follow Me .. and I will make you".
