26 weeks – half a year - of lockdown have now been experienced without any real end in sight. It may be time to review how that time has been spent and consider to what extent the purposes of God are being fulfilled. We are still called upon to "redeem the time".

Sunday Sermon: Aspects of Faith

Refreshed from his Hebridean holiday John started a new series on Aspects of Faith prompted by the challenging question at the end of the parable of the Persistent Widow: When the Son of man comes will He find faith on earth?

In the parables in Luke 18 which followed the exhortation to keep on praying and not give up, there is the depiction of two different approaches to prayer represented by the Pharisee and the taxcollector: the one proud and selfrighteous, the other humble and broken.

The parable was directed at **people**: some basking in their outward piety and practices and the others – standing afar off – conscious of their unworthiness.

The **process** of such praying contrasts the proud stance of the performance-oriented Pharisee with the contrite appeal to God of the publican.

And that difference is the **principle** that Jesus sought to emphasise – then for those two; and today for us who may unwittingly be cultivating a wrong attitude or humbly exercising true faith.

Bible Study

The Zoom Bible Study got off to a good start on Thursdays at 7 30 with David Jack providing an extra introduction to the inter-testament period, an excellent collection of references to the link between the testaments, Jim Flett's examples of promises from the OT being fulfilled in the New and a look at the structure of the NT. This Thursday we look at the Gospels with the homework being choosing one of the Gospels and saying what is special about it.
