Template for Worship: 1 Kings 8: 27 – 30

Having noted the 'wrongs' that necessitated Jesus cleansing the Temple in His day, it is good to see from the Old Testament, and Solomon's dedication in particular, a reminder that true worship entails a recognition of the greatness of God. As His temple we worship Him. And, that true worship has several features we do well to note and practise.

Humility is essential as we reflect that almighty God deigns to "fix in us Thy humble dwelling".

Within that dwelling, **communication** is important as God speaks and listens to us and we, then, listen and respond to Him.

Such interaction generates a **presence** – a sense of "Surely God is in this place"; an overwhelming awareness of God's awesome, holy presence when we gather.

What is more, God is **attentive** to our behaviour and being. "Thou God seest me" applies to all our living.

The Temple reflects God's **character** which, in turn, should impact ours.

It should inspire a **cry for help** as opposed to any self-righteousness on our part; and convey the appreciation and practice, of **forgiveness.** These features provide us with a template for true worship.
