Sunday Sermon 1 Peter 2: 1 - 8

Writing to challenge and encourage the believers facing adverse circumstances in his day, Peter focuses on the issue of a Sure Foundation. And so, over the last two Sundays, John has posed the question: What is our foundation.

The gospel is unequivocal in declaring that Jesus Christ is the sure – and only – foundation. God set Him there and He undertook to die for our sins and be raised again to empower new life. He is the Cornerstone. There is none other.

A Christian is someone who trusts in that Christ and seeks to live in full commitment to Him. Subsequent assurance comes through understanding the primacy of Christ in God's world and seeing the purpose of God in Christ in God's work.

It also means trusting in Christ through God's word and in God's way.

That deliberate trust means that Jesus directs our lives towards God. It means that being a Christian entails living for God in a way that is pleasing to him. He is our Shepherd, guiding, correcting, and providing.

It also means that Jesus delivers us from any shame, for "whoever believes *in him will never be put to shame.*" That is not true of those who reject him.

And, when we trust in Jesus, we can confidently depend on God to help us in our daily walk. As Paul was to say: "the life I now live, I live by faith in the Son of God who loved me and gave himself for me." It is "Christ in you, the hope of glory".

Passion for Life

There was a good number from several churches gathered on Saturday morning for the preparation session for A Passion for Life. Videos were shown followed by discussion and prayer. These preparation sessions will be held each month, - the next one is Saturday, 12th February from 10am to 12 noon,- where we can join with folk from the other participating churches in preparation for what lies ahead. It is a good opportunity to work together for the extension of His kingdom.

Bible Study

Alongside those training sessions we will continue with our Bible Study series going through the Book of Deuteronomy. Homework for Thursday is Chapters 1 – 4.
