God Making Peace Colossians 1: 15 - 24

The peace (that passes all understanding) which Jesus promised his disciples in John's Gospel, is a theme that is echoed in the experience of the early church as evidenced in the letters of Paul.

Writing to the Colossians, he explains the need for peace. Like all men they are in a world which is permeated by tension and conflict. Since the Fall, human behaviour is totally discordant both in relation to God and to other people. Not only does the Bible story illustrate the existence of that conflict, but human history since then abounds with evidence of it and its devastating effect. This sinful world certainly needs peace.

Exploring the nature of that warfare, verse 21 emphasises the nature of that conflict in that it is grounded in an alienation; mankind is at enmity and estranged from God. That shows itself in antagonism against God and others through a mind-set that leads to defiant actions which can only be described as evil. Our contemporary world and our existence abounds in manifestations of it.

God's answer to that devastation is seen in an action of grace where the Lord Jesus, his beloved Son, willingly surrendered himself as a sacrifice on Calvary, as a substitute, taking our place and punishment, in order to reconcile us to God. Faith in that brings forgiveness and new birth by his resurrection whereby we can be made 'holy' through Jesus' victory over Satan and sin. Continuing faith in that gospel brings hope, stability, and abiding peace.

Remember the Elders as they meet this morning to discern the Lord's leading in moving forward, not only in finding ways to restore 'normal service' but to exercise the collective responsibility of being "good stewards of the things of God" and seeing his will "being done on earth, as it is in heaven" in an effective way in our community and generation.
