Sunday Sermon: The Deity of Christ

Yesterday's services were taken by Simon Turner from Kilsyth Community Church in John's absence. Taking his text from John 1: 1-5 he focused on the Deity of Christ and stressed that it teaches that Jesus is God, not just a god among many alternatives; and warned us that whatever our verdict as to who Jesus is will determine our eternal destiny.

The passage contains four proofs that Jesus is God.

- Jesus is eternal. He is the Word the expression of God who was with God and was God from the beginning, not just an attribute of God but co-equal with God as a distinct Person.
- Jesus is Creative. Indeed 2 Corinthians
 17) states that those who believe in Him are "a new creatures in Christ" with "old things passed away and all things made new".
- Jesus is Life. Indeed Jesus himself says that acceptance of Him is to receive new life, spiritual life as he explained to Nicodemus.
- 4. Jesus is also light. He brings in truth and reality which transforms our living.

The incarnation means that Jesus as God has come to us in human form. That is the gospel. Yet, He needs to be received and definitely believed-in if we are to benefit from the salvation that he offers. Sadly, the people to whom Jesus came chose darkness rather than light. There is a danger that unless we accept Him by faith we, too, will end up lost in such darknesss.
