Sunday Sermon: The Final Doxology

Posing the question someone might ask us (What does your religion mean to you?) Jim Gourley drew attention to John's 'final doxology' in Revelation 1: 5-6 as an appropriate summary answer.

The first element is "Unto Him who has loved us?" The unconditional love God has for us is the basis for our faith. He loves us in spite of everything. As John 3: 16 says: "God so loved the world that he gave....."

That deliberate action of giving His Son for us and Jesus' subsequent death to atone for our sins in a substitutionary sacrifice means that we can be freed from our sins and bondage in this world. There is forgiveness through His Blood shed for us on Calvary. And there is new birth.

By His resurrection Christ is alive and dwells in us. In Christ we become 'new creatures', and are made to be part of His 'Kingdom' – a redeemed people, 'sons of God', a people ruled by God. There is a new perspective, a new reality, a genuine being 'born again' to a new hope. Belief in the Lord Jesus leads to that new life. Being part of God's people is a privilege we enjoy.

In that regenerated condition we are made to be priests to our God with direct access to the Godhead. That is significantly experienced in prayer where we can bring everything to Him and become involved in seeking His will to "be done on earth". Yet, while the privilege of being beneficiaries of such saving grace is ours, the glory belongs to God.

That is why we come to worship Him.

It was so good to have Inga join us at last Tuesday's Prayer meeting on Zoom.

For the past few weeks Inga has been in South Dakota where she received her Covid jabs and also some much-needed dental attention, taking advantage of the opportunity to avail herself of the better range of services available there. It has also been a good opportunity, away from the immediate pressures of Oaxaca, to continue working on presentations and papers in connection with her role as a key trainer. Both it, and the translation work itself, makes very heavy demands on time, energy and skills for both Inga and Sue as they continue to work diligently on translating the Scriptures into Mixtec.

The challenges are great. Not only do they face the task of finding the right words and phrases to accurately convey the meaning of concepts that are unfamiliar to that culture but they also have to cope with the vagaries of unreliable internet connections and poor power supplies. They have a good team of local helpers but they are often hampered by illness, family concerns and various pressures.

It is a real privilege to be constantly supporting the work.
