Sunday Sermon: Esther 9b and 10

The Book of Esther tells a remarkable story in a unique book. Tracing the sovereign work of God while the Jews were in a land of captivity, the narrative does not mention the name of God, per se, but clearly outlines His sovereign acts through people and events 'on the ground' as it were. From the evil designs of Haman in orchestrating the proposed annihilation of the Jewish people, which dominates the early chapters, the situation is overturned with Esther gaining favour and securing from the King a complete reversal of that plan. Destruction was turned to deliverance. That triumph was to be remembered in the Feast of Purim, still observed to this day.

Focusing on **Final Insights from Esther**John pointed out that:

- Deliverance is to be celebrated.
 Reflection on what has achieved salvation is a matter of joy and praise.
 Yet,
- Victory needs humility. It is not due to human achievement but to God's saving work. "Forbid it, Lord, that I should boast, save in the death of Christ my God".
- "The sun that melts butter hardens clay." Response to that grace can mean acceptance - or rejection.
- God honours his servants whose motives and actions are right.
- Grace transforms situations and people, because
- God is in sovereign control. That gives us great assurance as we trust in Him.
