Sunday Sermon: Total Trust

Continuing the theme of *aspects of endtime faith*, as found in Luke 18, this week's episode is the familiar story of Jesus welcoming the children who were brought to him to be blessed. It is a story that can teach us the positives of faith in these days of growing uncertainty and the resurgence of fear.

Sandwiched between the story of the selfrighteous Pharisee, who trusted in his religion, and the rich young man, who boasted of his wealth, it focuses on how we can be prepared for entry to the Kingdom. Rather than warn against hindrances to faith, reflecting on this incident promotes an attitude that can enhance living faith.

The clear message arising out of this real incident is that anyone who does not receive the Kingdom of God like a child will never, ever, enter it. The concern of the church is that all will gain a place in the Kingdom through simple, child-like faith. The secret of that is receptivity, open acceptance which is embraced with joy and gladness in total, unquestioning, trust. If that applies to children's behaviour towards parents and adults, then there are grounds for greater trust in a benevolent Heavenly Father, for:

> They that trust Him wholly, Find Him wholly true.

More Lockdown Reflections

Over these months several folks have shared their experiences with us. They have been a blessing. Here are two more thoughts that have come during this period of enforced lockdown.

Laraine Gourley shares: While listening to someone on TV, reading about someone, being introduced to someone or just looking at someone -- do we sometimes have pre-conceived ideas about their character or misjudge them? That is classic human behaviour. Yet the Bible says: "Man looks on the outward appearance but God looks at the heart." (1 Samuel 16: 7)

And Donald and Christine Crosbie share: The Covid 19 pandemic has been for many a time of anguish, separation and isolation. But God has not forgotten His people. An old chorus we sing at Maryhill says:-

He's always there when things go wrong He's always there when hope is gone He lifts me up when I'm in prayer He's never gone. When I'm alone God's always there.

When doubts arise and fear eats away at us it's good to remember that God has promised in his word to never leave us or forsake us. Even in our darkest moments He is with us. Trust in Him and He will surely see you through. God is still in control.

Finally

On the 26th May, 1940, King George VI called for a day of National Prayer. Our armies were trapped in France. Millions flocked to churches throughout the UK and Commonwealth praying for deliverance. In spite of the advice by German generals and military logic, Hitler ordered the suspension of his army's advance. On the 26th May a violent storm took place over the area of Dunkirk, preventing the Luftwaffe from strafing and bombing our troops making their way to the beaches. During the following days a great calm came over the English Channel enabling hundreds of small boats to cross the channel and save our troops. This became known as "The miracle of Dunkirk". The 9th June was designated as a day of National Thanksgiving and the people sang Psalm 124. Verse 8 which says "Our help is in the name of the Lord who made heaven and earth".

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
