The Nature of Unbelief - John 12: 1-11

Taking this passage for the second week, John, on this occasion, emphasised the contrast it contained between the devotional action of Martha in serving and Mary in pouring out the ointment in worship with the insidious unbelief that also resides in this incident arising out of explicit and implicit objection to such devotion. The positive and the negative.

For his part, Jesus commended the 'extravagant' devotion and said of Mary, when objections were raised, "Leave her alone" for he recognised not only her spontaneous worship but also the prophetic nature of her action in preparing him for his death, burial and resurrection.

Some of the unbelief, like that of the Chief Priests, was open and antagonistic. But Judas' unbelief was more subtle, for he masqueraded as one of the disciples.

That is the danger we need to be wary of. Unbelief is *determined* – doesn't happen by chance; *deceptive* in that the real motive is not apparent; *disturbing* because it is aggravated if encountering true belief; *dismissive* of devotion because it *disguises* itself as being concerned with alternative and 'superior' values, etc. But essentially it is *deluded* because it is subtly driven by self-centred motives. The chief priests thought about position and Judas was a thief deep down.

Yet, the good news is that such delusional unbelief can be destroyed by putting our trust in Jesus, having first examined our hearts to see where we really stand.

Meeting Arrangements

With the easing of Covid restriction from 26th March, we will be able to gather for Sunday worship in the church this Sunday after being 'in exile' more-or-less for a year. On both Palm Sunday (28th March) and Easter Day (4th April) there will be one service at 10 30am which may also be available on Zoom if the technology allows. Then, from Sunday 11th April, it is intended to revert to two different services at 10 30am and 6 30pm, each day, DV.

The Prayer Meeting and Bible Study will be held as normal this week but, with Holy Week services being held next week, there will be no Tuesday Prayer Meeting on the 30th or Bible Study on the 1st, but the 10am morning prayer sessions on the Wednesday and Friday will continue.
