Sunday Sermon

Our guest speaker yesterday was Ricky McAddock of Street Connect. Others from the Team joined him at night and shared testimony of what God is doing through Street Connect. But, at the morning service, he spoke on sanctification.

Taking 2 Corinthians 3 18 as his text, he introduced the concept as being the work of God the Holy Spirit sanctifying us. While initially that is positional – registered and guaranteed through His covenant – it is also progressive in that the promised transformation needs to be realised in practice.

Three pictures help us to understand.

Comparing ourselves with an onion, our condition is revealed layer by layer and the sanctifying work needs to go deeper and deeper each time.

Isaiah 48 speaks of God's work as refining us by His Spirit. As we go through experiences, dross rises to the surface and needs to be skimmed off in a process of purification. This may often be through adversity – as we have been learning from Job.

John 15 presents the familiar picture of cultivating a vine. Pruning the plant means getting rid of rogue and redundant growth because it is worthless. It also means pruning 'good' growth because there is a danger it might become dominant or proud and hinder the flourishing of better and more productive fruit.

How well do we embrace God's sanctifying power in our lives?

Reflections

- > The craftsmanship on the precious stones and metals was exquisite reminding us that it is our privilege to be His craftwork, 'clothed in his righteousness' and reflecting his glory. We are even called jewels in his crown.
- The preparations for making the Tabernacle were so detailed that it reminds us of God's concern that we should be made like him, even in the smallest aspects of our Christian character.
- What stood out was the glory of God filling the Tabernacle that had been made for him to dwell in. Even today, it is His presence that makes the difference as we offer him a home to dwell in, both as individual Christians and as a church. Longing for that reviving should be our constant prayer.
- It all takes time and a willing heart.

Perhaps, like myself, you were part of an organisation or place of education that had a motto. I remember my BB days and its motto: "Sure & Steadfast" and my early working days in stockbroking when the motto of the London Stock Exchange was: "My Word Is My Bond " As Christians, should we have a motto? In 1 Thessalonians 5: 7 Paul says, "Pray without ceasing." Perhaps, as a church and as individuals, we should consider adopting that as our motto. As followers of Jesus Christ, we should never stop praying, despite how dark and hopeless our case may seem to be, trusting in him. May God help us to do that.
