Turn Your Eyes Upon Jesus

Following on from the phrase cited at the end of last week's sermon – They looked for Jesus – John took us to Philippians and Paul's very personal plea to a church that was showing signs of issues which might affect its testimony. Christian life in an alien environment was becoming a challenge. Yet, echoing previous sermons, they had been "called to be saints" and to be part of His purpose. Being loved by God did not exempt them from facing hardships. Indeed it was a privilege to be 'witnesses' in such a context. Constantly, he echoes a note of joy and rejoicing. How can that be?

The answer is not to look at problems but to look to Jesus: to share His mind-set.

Paul reminds them that, having Jesus, they should be **encouraged** because of their union with Christ; **comforted** in being loved by God; enjoy **fellowship in the Spirit**; and appreciate experiencing and expressing **tenderness and compassion**.

Why were they in danger of becoming disintegrated? It wasn't the enemy or circumstances but their own self-centredness. So, having Jesus, then let us "forget about ourselves and concentrate on Him" thus walking worthy of our vocation and reflecting His purpose.

Tunnel Vision

Passing through this strange experience of being in lockdown is almost like being in a tunnel. Yet, we have heard much through ministry and communications to give the assurance that not only is God with us but that He also will use this to further his purposes if we believe and respond aright. So, a key question is: what are we learning in this experience? What changes is God seeking to effect in us as individuals and as a church through our response to it all. What will be our "tunnel" vision?

I would like to thank you all for your prayers as I travelled from Mexico. The journey went well. All the restaurants in Paris were closed, so that meant I couldn't buy any meals, but I did have snacks along with me. The airport was almost empty.

I have settled in to an Airbnb flat in Dalkeith. I will be here for the 14 days quarantine, and then I will move along the road to stay with some good friends for the duration of my teaching responsibilities, which end at the beginning of June. The length of my stay in Scotland, in one sense, will be determined by the situation with COVID-19. However, ultimately the details are in God's hands. Please pray for me as I teach, and also that God would overrule as to when I can get back home to Mexico.
