Sunday Sermon: House of Prayer (Isaiah 56:1-8; Mark 11: 17)

Continuing the series on Jesus' interaction with the Temple, based on His quotations from the OT, this week brought us to Isaiah 56: 7 – "My house shall be called a House of Prayer for all nations".

Clearly, for Him, how the people worshipped God was a priority. If that was right, other things would follow. And, that might be the primary concern for us today as we evaluate our lives — individually and corporately as a church — in the light of what God is saying to us at this time. In that process, prayer is clearly a priority.

In interacting with the Temple in this dramatic way, Jesus was clearly guided by the authority of Scripture, frequently quoting: 'it is written'.

That Scripture gives abundant insight into what the purpose of the 'temple' is, and should be: a house of prayer, a place where God himself dwells, whose very artefacts, whether the Temple furniture or the 'fruit of the Spirit' in our lives, speak of the character of God.

So, what does it mean for us to be a house of prayer? How do we give prayer — interaction with God Himself — the place it should have? No longer a physical building, but a spiritual body, we should be distinguished by total commitment, through prayer, to the purpose of God.

The Atlantic battle was the longest continuous campaign of WW2. Allied aircraft could only give limited protection to the convoys. When these aircraft left them, the convoys entered an area of sea dubbed "The Black Pit". Mariners were aware that German U-Boat wolf-packs were waiting for them. But, in March 1943, special new aircraft called Liberators were deployed on convoy duty. These aircraft could protect the convoys all the way from America to Britain. So, from this point, many more battles were fought and victory was assured.

Just as these mariners took comfort knowing that friendly aircraft were above them, we take comfort in God's word. Psalm 91 v 4 declares: "under His wings you will find refuge".
