Recognising Responsibility 2 Thess 3:6-18

Concluding the short series on 2
Thessalonians, John focused on the closing verses of this second epistle.
Among all the positive aspects of their collective testimony it appears that some were not acting responsibly and thereby tarnishing their witness. These verses call us to:

Recognise our responsibility to obey the word of God. Mankind has a sad history of not being obedient hence the strength of the command to now obey.

Recognise our responsibility to live a life that exemplifies what we believe and not be inconsistent. Faith should impact the way we live.

Recognise our responsibility as a church to exercise discipline. In a world that dislikes being disciplined, or imposing discipline, it is important to realise that the motivation for such action should always be redemptive, not punitive. Right discipline is a sign of love. It should be done by the church as a whole and against a pattern of wrong doing, not just a single act. And, when practised, take the form of 'distancing' to avoid false nurture, risky contamination or compromise.

Recognise the responsibility to do the right thing. Acting responsibly can be tiring but should be consistently persevered with.

Recognise our responsibility to stay focused on Jesus. He is the only source of sustenance and the giver of grace "to help in time of need". In short:

Keep your eyes on Jesus
