Sunday Sermon: Esther 7

Resuming the series on the Book of Esther John focused on the events that came to light showing the motivating factors that were behind Haman's downfall. The scenario in the book presents the existence of two forces, the one seeking to destroy the other, which remind us that even in our day Satan is opposed to God's people and their work.

In these events we see that **evil is personal.** While malevolent forces are constantly in operation, the reality is that evil actions reside in, and are carried out by, people in what they do and are. Sin manifests itself in our behaviour despite laws and counsel that would advocate otherwise.

Not only is evil constant but **evil is persistent**: it will never give up and will always seek a way to succeed. Despite Haman and his evil purposes having been uncovered he persisted, showing no confession or admission of guilt. He was intent on pursuing his mission. That is true of Christian experience: temptation is always present and will never go away.

Yet, this chapter shows that **evil will pass away.** The very outcome that Haman envisaged, both the public execution of Mordecai and the decree seeking the annihilation of the Jews, were providentially overturned when the tables were turned on him and his plans.

As God's people – if we truly have trusted in Him for salvation – that Jesus died for our sins, and rose again triumphant, is the glorious assurance of salvation victory.
