"You have not gone this way before" Joshua 3: 4

As we move out of the severest restrictions from the pandemic it is important that the church learns from the experience and goes into this new sphere of life committed to whatever God has for us to do. Such changes can be daunting and to help us in the process we are going to look at some lessons from Joshua recognising that as we embrace the future, "we have not gone this way before"!

In the first of this short series, we are encouraged by seeing two basic principles that are powerful in encouraging the children of God in their journey with Him.

In the first place we were reminded that although we have not gone this way before, God has. God is a God who goes before His people as he proved in the rescue from Egypt and the years in the wilderness. He has guided His church through wars, plagues and disasters and we can trust that He goes before us, knowing and preparing every twist and turn of life and asking us to trust Him and obey Him. Although the next steps are unknown to us they are completely known to GOD.

Secondly, we are reminded that God does not deviate from His plan. Crisis forces worldly leaders to react and respond to situations, but nothing is a surprise to GOD and therefore as He leads His people, He takes us on a roadmap that never needs revision or alteration. From the beginning of the Bible to its end we see that God is shaping a people to be with HIM forever and there is no pandemic or disaster that alters His eternal purpose. The challenge for us as it was in Joshua's days is to see what steps we must take to get where God wants us.
