Sunday Sermon: Acts 2: 1 - 21

Celebrating Whit Sunday the focus was on 'Pentecostal Preaching', meaning the substance of what was preached at Pentecost.

Whereas the redemptive acts of Jesus – His death and resurrection – took place at Passover this event took place during the Feast of Weeks marking the coming down of God in power by the Holy Spirit.

So, what were the marks of Holy Spirit activity as recorded in these verses?

Primarily it involved speaking God's word comprehensively albeit accompanied by 'tongues and fire'. Peter explained these phenomena by quoting the Joel prophecy proclaiming the word of God in this situation and in this sequence.

The message spoken carried Biblical authority: it was a declaration of God's promised purpose. It focused on Christ's accomplishment, now endorsed by inspiration, application, power and enabling.

As such it received God's accreditation that what was spoken was 'of God'. It also revealed God's purpose in redeeming a people. For this Jesus, "whom you crucified" was raised by God's power and it was rewarded with God's authority for it declares "this same Jesus as Lord and Christ". It recognised Jesus Christ as God's true Saviour.

Such preaching and such a message demands spiritual action. They were "cut to the heart" repented and were baptised. So should we repent and be baptised.

Quo Vadis?

Sunday 29th May turned out to be a very special day. In addition to being introduced to Simon and Hannah Snodgrass – and wee Edith – we were given an insight into the extensive ministry of Child Evangelism Fellowship, both the work that is done worldwide and what is happening with weekly children's meetings and holiday clubs here in Scotland.

And, the evening ministry was quite challenging. It spoke of Nehemiah, returning to a devastated Jerusalem, motivated by God ("what my God had put in my heart to do") and examining the situation so that he – along with others - could take restorative action.

Hearing encouraging reports of increasing attendance at our activities is good reason for us to be conscious that God is "doing a great work" among us and should surely inspire us to greater commitment to pray for, and to seek, "Thy will be done on earth" here in our area and among our local churches.

The challenge to "Let us rise and build" is surely timely, knowing that "Except the Lord builds the house, they labour in vain".
