Sunday Sermon: 1 Corinthians 15: 20-28

Continuing the series on the implications of what happened at Easter, this morning's sermon was titled: **Death is defeated**.

When dealing with death, what is significant in Biblical teaching is that Jesus, unlike other commentators or self-proclaimed 'experts' on the topic, Himself experienced it and overcame it through the resurrection – impossible though that might sound to sceptical minds – both for himself and for humanity. It makes the Christian gospel unique and complete.

Looked at in context it calls for us to accept the ongoing inevitability of death for everyone, regardless. All die, whatever age, stage, class or context. Even believers in the resurrection die. It is a fate that befalls everyone: "dust to dust".

While that applies to the material nature of death it is important to **understand the spirituality of death**. It is not just a matter of physiology and material existence. God created humanity a spiritual being with a soul capable of relationship with God. Death does not end that relationship to an eternal God. There is life after 'death'. The Christian gospel – with the facts of the death and resurrection of Jesus at its heart – speaks of hope. "Death is vanquished".

In the resurrection, Jesus conquered death and its hold on humanity. It therefore behoves us to **experience the victory of death** accomplished by Jesus in our own lives through saving faith and submission to his living his life out in us.

Mission of the Month

This month's Mission is CEF (Child Evangelism Fellowship) an international mission focusing on reaching children with the gospel and nurturing them in the Christian Faith. Two of their workers, based in Scotland, Simon and Hannah Snodgrass, have been a real answer to prayer in taking over the running of our #One2Seven each week (19 children attending last week) free of charge. They will also be conducting the Holiday Club during the last week in June.

At the Bible Study last Thursday, reflecting on Joshua's example, Inga shared with us the motivation that led her to be giving her life to translating the word of God into Mixtec. Lessons from Joshua

Among the lessons learned from looking at Chapter 1 of Joshua were those that spoke of Joshua's call, his vision, the assurance he was given and the need to abide by the word of God.

There were lessons, too, relating to all the people for they also were crucially involved in this great project. It was a general command to prepare themselves for what lay ahead and also specific responsibility placed on those who had opted for more congenial locations but were nevertheless fully committed to see the task through to the end.
