In the current crisis there is increasing talk of – and a looking forward to – the easing of restrictions. It was Elijah's servant who saw a cloud "the size of a man's hand" promising rain after famine and drought. That is a key issue for us. We are all looking forward to some release. But, what are we looking for? Same old? Or a 'new normal'? Perplexed though he was, Habakkuk was told, "Look ... for I am going to do something in your days that you would not believe even if you were told". It won't happen automatically. It will require cooperation and commitment on our part. The OT story shows how the nation simply drifted back to their old apostate ways. Let's make sure that through this crisis we "seek the Lord while He may be found" and not "spend money on that which is not bread". God is redemptive but the just will (only) live by faith: our trust in God's ability. So, like Habakkuk, let's take our stand on the watchtower and discern what God is saying and what He wants us to be doing, both now and when release comes.

The Unchanging Truth

This Sunday's sermon, the second on the Book of Habakkuk, was preached against a background of a turbulent week where the continuing apprehension about Covid 19 and its adverse effects was exacerbated by the worldwide outbreak of protests and violence. If there was reason to fear before, then that has been intensified greatly. It is in that context that Habakkuk's message becomes very pertinent.

Fretting over the question of where is God in all this, Habakkuk is led to look and see what God is already doing – and will do – among the nations, leading to an important principle: that God Almighty is deliberately at work in human history.

Strange though these actions may seem, it leads to a second principle: Truth doesn't

change. God is still God. He is from everlasting to everlasting. The circumstances of life do not change God. He is over all, a fact demonstrated at the Cross where Jesus faced sin's chief weapon – death - and triumphed.

What should Habakkuk do? He takes his stand to watch it all unfolding even though he does not fully understand. He takes it to God and 'leaves it there'. Although still perplexed, his fear is gradually being changed to faith.

And what should that mean for us?
Suggesting practical steps to learn from this transition, John quoted James
Montgomery Boyce, outlining some steps: detach yourself from the problem; take it to God – and leave it with Him; expect God to answer, and be persistent. He will answer the heartfelt: "How long?"
