Sunday Sermon: Romans 2: 1 - 16

In sharing the gospel with the church in Rome, Paul spoke of it as God offering His righteousness to replace the ungodliness – and unrighteousness – of mankind and would be effected by the Holy Spirit. Fundamentally, God's wrath is against that wickedness of man, details of which are explicated in the rest of chapter 1. Yesterday's message declared that God will judge that sinful behaviour. Only God can judge it .. and He certainly will.

Taking **aspects of God's judgement** it was emphasised that it is, and will be, on the basis of truth, or reality. Mere knowledge of what is right and wrong is insufficient: the critical factor is practice. Therefore it is inexcusable and inescapable; for conscience, as well as the Law, decrees it.

Based on God's love and on reality, it is both righteous and impartial. It is also certain and will be intense in its inevitability and its application.

Yet, it is essentially the gospel – good news - for it declares the compassion of God as the satisfying of that wrath is made through Jesus by His substitutional death and resurrection at Calvary.

Such a gospel – to be effective – needs to be preceded by an acknowledgement that "vile and full of sin I am" expressed in genuine repentance and followed by personal faith in the gospel of which Paul is "not ashamed, for it is the power of God unto salvation"

Familiar though we are with our sinfulness may we also know what it is to be "saved from the wrath to come".

What I was reminded of powerfully in both conferences this Spring is that the LORD is not discouraged by these things for He is still in complete control and is working out the fulfilment of His word as we await Jesus' return. Not one of His promises have failed, therefore despite all the negativity that can surround us, we look forward with hope.
