Sunday Sermon: 1 Corinthians 15: 50 - 58

Yesterday saw the conclusion of this excellent and interesting series on the significance of resurrection, based on Paul's great chapter in 1 Corinthians 15, in response to the question: Easter is over, what's next?

Previous sermons have highlighted the fact that the truth of resurrection is proof of forgiveness, the defeat of death and the promise of a glorious future. That knowledge is not only comforting and reassuring but has an immediate value in that it stimulates **daily strength.**

Knowing what is tied up in the process of resurrection, as demonstrated by Christ, and is applied to the believer, is a **motive for perseverance**. Work, such as the Thessalonian "labour of love", etc, will be rewarded despite all the hardship in its execution and disappointments at the difference between it and the world's perception of values.

It reveals the momentum of God's power. The energising of the Christian walk is done because Jesus is alive; and alive and active in the believer. Paul could only 'do all things' because of the power that came 'through Christ'. All he wanted was "to know Him and the power of his

resurrection".

And the evidence of that power 'at work in you' is a measure of God's presence in our daily witness and testimony, knowing that "if the Spirit of him who raised up Christ from the dead is living in you, he will also give life to your mortal bodies because of his Spirit who lives in you".

We are the Snodgrass Family - Simon, Hannah, and our daughter Edith. We work with Child Evangelism Fellowship (CEF) in Scotland. I (Simon) am from Northern *Ireland and Hannah is from the USA. We* trained together at CEF in Northern *Ireland for two years before we moved to* Scotland in June 2021. The Lord laid on our hearts the words of Psalm 78 v4, 6. Our desire is to see this generation of children and future generations hear the truths of the Gospel, put their hope in Christ alone, and be discipled by God's Word in local Bible believing churches. Praying for Inga

It's good to have Inga 'home' with us for these two months. Here is an extract from her recent Prayer Letter which gives an insight into the challenges translators like her and Sue face as they seek to make the Word of God available in the mother tongue. "I really enjoy being involved in the translation. The question that the team asks can be interesting. For example, as we were reading through Mark's Gospel with the St Andrews team we came to 1: 45 where it says, "Jesus could no longer enter freely into the towns.". One wanted to know if there was a demonstration which prevented Jesus entering the town. This question illustrates the huge challenge for translators – the Mixtecs interpret Scripture through their own cultural grid. Often in Oaxaca City there are blockades which prevent free flow of traffic. So a demonstration would be a logical reason for Jesus not to be able to enter."

Finally,

We have heard of the depraved actions of the Russian forces on the civilian population in Ukraine. The Ukrainian authorities have shone a light on this lawlessness and are endeavouring to bring these crimes to the International Court at the Hague. They also highlight this to sway public opinion against Russia. The truth of the matter is that sin is common to all men, not just one particular people. There is a constant battle within our own souls. As the Apostle Paul says in Romans 7 v 15 "For I do not understand my own actions. For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate". Is this the same man who wrote "If any man be in Christ, he is a new creature"? Yes it is. He knew the reality of his depraved nature. We blame the accuser for our actions, but in reality, the battle within us is between the new and old nature. Whether you are a Christian for 1 week or 70 years, the battle is ongoing. It is comforting to know that even Paul, who wrote half of the New Testament Scriptures, endured the same trials and battles within himself, just as we do.
