Lessons from Jonah: Alan Clark

Our visiting speaker today was Alan Clark, an elder in the Tron Church and Scottish Representative for the Slavic Gospel Association. He preached on the Book of Jonah and its lessons for us today.

The world Jonah was part of, like ours, is a godless one with the leadership of Israel and the Gentile world quite apostate. Yet, the book shows that God is interested in the ungodly. Chapter 1 shows three aspects of that concern.

In the first instance, **the Lord calls** by His Word which came to Jonah for a purpose that included both a warning against apostasy and the offer of a way of salvation. And we know that "God who spoke to our fathers by the prophets has spoken to us by his Son. God's word comes to us to share with the world.

Most of the chapter shows that **the Lord pursues** both Jonah, who was fleeing from the call of God and the mission to Nineveh, and also the sailors who happened to be manning the boat. Whatever our situation – rebellion, unbelief or ignorance – God diligently pursues with His offer of grace and salvation.

More than that, **the Lord appoints.** In this situation God appointed a storm to warn against running away and a 'great fish' to rescue Jonah. In our day he has made greater provision through the death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus. Through repentance for our sins and faith in that provision we can obtain that salvation and share it with others.

The Elders and Future Arrangements

The Elders express their appreciation for so much prayer on their behalf as they continue to consider practical steps for the way ahead. With our being in Level Zero, social distancing is now down to 1 metre, giving greater flexibility, and allowing restricted singing in the services.

Our regular activities, such as Mother and Toddlers, Hashtag, Ladies Meeting, will resume later in the year. Looking ahead, there is the prospect of a young couple from Child Evangelism Fellowship helping out with our children's work; and of the Faith Mission's Rejuvenate and Youth Rallies starting up in the autumn.

However, there is an anxiety that having "not passed this way before" we do not simply revert to 'business as usual' and the complacency it generates, but to 'rise up and go', increasing our prayer, commitment, outreach and fellowship in more tangible ways, for 'where there is no vision, the people will perish'.

That is a task the Lord has entrusted to his people. And, as recent ministry has emphasised, he not only gives the enabling through the work of the Holy Spirit but also the peace that passes all understanding. As the parable says of faithful servants, "we have only done what was our duty".

Our national situation - and that prevalent in the world - calls for prayer that, despite rampant godlessness, believers will be spared persecution, be encouraged in their stances and that secular leaders acknowledge God in the discharge of their responsibility.
