# Sunday Sermon: Colossians 3: 16

The 'text' at last Sunday evening's Bible-Study-focused service was "Thy Word have I hid in my heart". That was followed yesterday with Paul's exhortation to the Colossians to "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly".

Colosse was one of a group of churches set in a cosmopolitan valley. The effect of that environment was compromise which weakened their faith as it did in neighbouring Laodicea. It made them prone to accept false alternatives and begin to doubt fundamental truths.

It was against this background that Paul reminded them that Christ was the full embodiment of God himself and that, having trusted in that Christ, they were lacking nothing in the potential of their Christian experience.

But they did need to make an effort. Telling them to 'seek those things from above' he encouraged them to take practical steps to ensure that they benefitted from Christ living in them.

Each word in that exhortation is significant. By saying **Let** they were to actively allow it to **dwell** in their hearts. It wasn't to be a passing thought but something more permanent residing **in you,** influencing, affecting and almost controlling their life and conduct. It would not be sufficient to simply refer to a few Scripture verses but to think Biblically: to think as God does. And that can only come about as we read the whole of the Bible and let it permeate all of our very being. That's the importance of **richly.**

## **Translation Challenge**

Sue Huggins shared this piece to illustrate the challenge of translation.

This nugget of Scripture encapsulates the Gospel message:

"For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life." John 3:16

Yet the shocking fact is that of the 7360 living languages in the world today, fewer than half have this essential truth in their mother tongue. That means that over 3000 languages have yet to hear of God's amazing love for them.

This gargantuan need motivates us to press on with the task of Bible translation, the Church's assignment to make God's love known to all people.

Thank you for your part in helping one minority language in southern Mexico to have access to God's Word.
