## Sunday Sermon: Luke 24 24: 1 − 12

We were reminded that increasingly in our commercial world the Easter season is becoming like Christmas with its emphasis on gifts and cards and food etc.

Be that as it may, for Christians there are significant similarities in that the focus is on Jesus, the Son of God, the Messiah.

While at Christmas we rejoice at the good news that God came into our world physically in a miraculous way through the virgin birth and, theologically, in that "God was in Christ" and that "in Him all the fulness of the Godhead dwells, bodily"

At Easter that incarnate Jesus was crucified, bearing our sins, died – and miraculously was raised from the dead in a glorious resurrection. He had come to fulfil a mission. He came to seek and to save that which is lost.

Responding by faith to that message can surely be **the dawn of a new day.**
