Sunday Sermon: Romans 1: 1 - 6

The guest preacher yesterday morning was Fraser Allan (Sandy and Janice Allan's son) who based his message on the early verses of Romans, where Paul introduces himself to the Roman church and also helps us in the understanding of our own identity.

Introducing himself to this church which he had never visited, and whose members he had never met, he describes himself simply as "Paul, servant of Jesus Christ". Elsewhere in his letters we get a glimpse of his considerable learning and status but, following his dramatic conversion on the road to Damascus, he is simply a Christian, dead to himself and totally dependent on Jesus living in him. "I live, yet not I but Christ lives in me; and the life I now live I live by faith in the Son of God who loved me and gave himself for me". In the same way our **identity** is only really established when we accept our own sinfulness, and Christ's atoning death for us on the Cross; and allow Him to live His life in us. That means that we are "born again" and become "new creatures".

Paul also, in these verses, indicated that being a servant not only defined his identity but also established his **purpose.** . He was called of God to share that gospel - which he believed was the "power of God unto salvation" to both Jew and Gentile. It was something that he owed to Rome – and the world.

Proclaiming that gospel with conviction and confidence should also be our purpose too.
