Sunday Sermon: Jonah 1: 1-17

Responding to welcoming comments, Simon wished to publicly thank the church fellowship for their prayers and support; and acknowledged the contribution of the team of volunteers in the vital children's work.

Looking at the story of Jonah, with the tentative title of *What does the world say to the church*, we see Jonah as the reluctant missionary.

Though commissioned to take God's message to hostile Nineveh, Jonah ran away and took a ship in the opposite direction, presumably afraid to go to an enemy nation and be favourably disposed to a people he disliked. While the story suggests it was evidence of God's grace and an example of God shaming Israel by reaching out to a foreign nation. But, Jonah disobeyed, ran away.

On the ship, thinking he was going "away from the presence of the Lord", he was obliviously asleep while a storm was raging and the heathen sailors were more than conscious that this was a divine occurrence. They challenged Jonah. Slowly he realised what he was doing and volunteered that they should discard him overboard and not suffer further because of him ad his disobedience.

Once that was done, the storm abated and Jonah was swallowed up by a Godprovided "big fish" and subsequently fulfil the original mission.

For us it is a warning to obey the heavenly calling and to make sure that we call on the true God rather than an alternative.

Start Ups

Last week saw our outreach activities start up again. Two had got going the week before, with 41 children at Toddlers, which is currently not recruiting because of capacity. And, the Prayer meeting was well motivated with fervent prayer for the range of activities being taken up and evidence of answered prayer in individual lives. Hashtag got off to a good start with a dozen at the younger group and four older ones, with more to come next week.
