Sunday Sermon: Romans 8: 9 - 11

Under the title **The Spirit of Certainty** John continued his series looking at aspects of the assurance of salvation as set out in the significant eighth chapter of Romans.

In the earlier verses we saw that there are two ways of living, either according the flesh (the old nature) or by the Spirit (the new life). Both tend to be in conflict with each other causing uncertainty as to spiritual health and wellbeing.

But there is 'no condemnation' because God's provision in Jesus overcomes the hold and claim of the old nature.

Regardless of being plagued by the potential confusion it is important to realise that the only **source of spiritual certainty is God.** Assurance of being a Christian is based on the fact that Christ is in you by the Spirit. Equally, the corollary is true that if there is no evidence of having trusted in the gospel and been 'born again' by the Spirit then we do not have certainty of being a Christian.

That truth needs to be **applied personally.** Earlier in Romans, Paul has explained that Jesus died instead of us, bearing our sins, but was raised from the dead by the Holy Spirit. If God thus raised Jesus from the dead that same Spirit will enable the believer to have victory over sin and walk in the Spirit experiencing the virtue of Christian life.

That Spirit will also be the means of our being raised at the 'Last Day' of glorious resurrection.

"What a day, glorious day, that will be"
