## Sunday Sermon: Jonah 2: 1 - 10

With John away ministering in a Communion Season on the Isle of Lewis, yesterday's services were taken by Simon Snodgrass.

During a previous service in September he had preached on lessons from chapter 1 of the book about Jonah as a reluctant prophet running away in disobedience from the commission to take God's message to Nineveh.

That journey had ended in disaster with the runaway prophet, cast overboard, and swallowed by a big fish provided by God. At the end of chapter 2 that same fish spewed Jonah out. But, in between, Jonah had prayed out of desperation.

Through that experience Jonah came to realise that **God still hears** prayers, even of those who have failed Him and fallen short of His requirements. Here Jonah prayed best he could in the desperate situation. There is no correct way to pray other than as a genuine approach to God, who will listen and answer.

Unknown to Jonah, but not to God, is the fact that **God rules**. In his providence, God was making provision for the situation to be resolved and the lesson subsequently learned.

Mercifully, what God had provided came into operation; for the big fish that had swallowed Jonah (and taken him on an unexpected 'retreat', as it were) eventually threw him out alive, showing that **God saves**,

Is God taking us through an experience to teach us to trust and obey Him?

Whilst this approach to communion may seem alien to many, it is a powerful reminder how much care and thought should go into our participation in the Breaking of Bread lest we eat and drink judgment on ourselves.
