Sunday Sermon: Mark 1: 1 - 15

Beginning a new series based on Mark's Gospel, John pointed out that, although it does not record the birth and early life of Christ, it does emphasise what His coming signifies.

It heralds a glorious new beginning, good news to a people forlorn of hope, sourced in the person of Jesus, the Messiah promised in the Old Testament, who has now appeared. Accepting Him will involve change through repentance and cleansing from the sins of the past, entered into now by token baptism in the wilderness, but fully effected by the Holy Spirit when they truly believe in Jesus.

So, John the Baptist, in presenting Jesus as the One come from God, declares **that the time has come**: the promised Saviour is here.

The time has come for God to move significantly in his plan of redemption. By being baptised along with the others, Jesus identifies with humanity and become an accessible Savour.

It is also **time for Satan to be confronted** and his hold on fallen sinners to be broken.

It is also time for human beings to recognise this good news, turn from their sins and submit themselves to Jesus and be subjects of his kingdom. It is the leaving of one (failing) way of living and, being born again, to give ourselves to the new life God has for us and which Jesus came to provide. Indeed, the time has come for us to follow Jesus: for now is the time of salvation.

They think they have no Heavenly Father who cares for them as you and me". Jesus told us that we are far more valuable than birds and to stop worrying and to cast our care upon HIM.
